Welcome to the Maundy Thursday Service of Tenebrae Apríl 17, 2025 - 7:00 p.m.

A Service of Tenebrae, or Darkness, is based on a 12th century night service and is an extended meditation on the passion of Christ, allowing the Scriptures themselves to be the central message of the evening. It begins with the Sacrament of Holy Communion, picking up the story of Christ's passion from the Last Supper. As each lesson is read, a candle is extinguished. The final act of Tenebrae is the stripping of the altar and silence, to symbolize the stark reality of Christ's sacrifice for love of humankind.

*Call to Worship

- One: As Jesus took bread and broke it, sharing it with friends.
- All: So he was broken to feed us with the bread of life.
- One: As Jesus took wine and poured it out, grapes crushed and drained to a husk.
- All: So he was crushed and drained of life.
- One: As Jesus prayed in agony of spirit that the cup of suffering might pass untasted.
- All: His sweat fell like drops of blood, yet he endured the pain.
- One: As Christ hung upon a tree and was crucified for us, looking with compassion on his murderers in their guilt,
- All: So Christ still looks with compassion on us, who are equally accountable for his suffering and death.
- One: As Jesus died for us and was buried in the ground, a seed that in death would produce a plentiful harvest of new life.
- All: So may we too be willing to die to ourselves and live for others, that all may find true and eternal life through Christ, whom we worship this night.

*Gathering Hymn: "And Did You Know

- 3) And did you know that while it was still dark, your fiercest enemies would rub their hands, and scoundrels who were game for any bribe would lie and lie again to seal your fate?

- 4) And did you know when, with your healing hands, you broke the bread and shared the cup of wine, and feasted in the face of certain death, that we in this place may do so again?
- 5) Then, Jesus, on you fearless faith we lean. Here let us taste the food and drink of heaven, and in it own the brokenness we cause, and Through it know that all can be forgiven.

Confession and Pardon:

- L: Beloved, Christ shows us his love by becoming a humble servant. Let us draw near to God and confess our sin in the truth of God's Spirit.
- P: Most Merciful God, we your Church confess that often our spirit has not been that of Christ. Where we have failed to love one another as he loves us; where we have pledged loyalty to him with our lips and them betrayed, deserted, or denied him, forgive us, we pray; and by your Spirit make us faithful in every time of trial; through Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior. Amen.

Time of Silent Meditation

L: Who is in a position to condemn? Only Christ. But Christ suffered and died for us, was raised from the dead for us, and continues to intercede for us. Believe the Good News: In the name of Jesus Christ, you are forgiven.

ALL: In the name of Jesus Christ, you are forgiven! Glory be to God! Amen.



- One: The Lord be with you

- One: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God
- All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.
- One: It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere, to give thanks to you, Almighty God, creator of heaven and earth. You formed us in your image, delivered us from captivity, and made covenant to be our sovereign God. You fed us manna in the wilderness and gave grapevines to evidence the promised land. And so, with your people on earth and all the company of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:





One: Holy are you, and blessed is your son, Jesus Christ. When we had turned aside from your way and abused your gifts, you gave us in Christ your crowning gift. Emptying himself, that our joy might be full, he fed the hungry, healed the sick, ate with sinners, washed his disciples' feet, and gave a holy meal as a pledge of his abiding presence.

On this very night, while they were eating, Jesus took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it, gave it to the disciples and said: "Take; eat; this is my body given for you."

And then he took a cup and after giving thanks, he gave it to them saying: "Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for the forgiveness of sins. As often as you do this, remember me. Truly I tell you, I will not drink again of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's Kingdom."

And so, in remembrance of these, your mighty acts in Christ Jesus, we offer ourselves in praise and thanksgiving, as a holy and living sacrifice, in union with Christ's offering for us, as we proclaim the mystery of faith:



- One: Pour out your Holy Spirit on us gathered here, and on these gifts of bread and cup. Make them hold for us the body and blood of Christ; that we may be for the world the body of Christ, redeemed by his blood. By your Spirit, make us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world; through your son Jesus Christ, who taught us to pray together...
- All: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever.


