Litany of Confession:

[written by Rev Erica Wimber Avena; as adapted from *Letters and Papers from Prison: After Ten Years: An Account at the Turn of the Year 1942-1943*, by Dietrich Bonhoeffer, translated by Barbara and Martin Rumscheidt, pp. 28.]

- One: We can truly share only in a limited measure in the suffering of others.
- All: We are not Christ, but if we want to be Christians it means that we are to take part in Christ's greatness of heart,
- One: in the responsible action that in freedom seizes the hour and faces the danger,
- All: and in the true sympathy that springs forth not from fear but from Christ's freeing and redeeming love for all who suffer.
- One: Inactive waiting and dully looking on these are not Christian responses.
- All: Christians are called to action and sympathy, not through their own firsthand experiences but by the immediate experience of others, for whose sake Christ suffered.
- One: It is infinitely easier to suffer in obedience to a human command than in the freedom of one's very own responsible action.
- All: It is infinitely easier to suffer in community with others than in solitude.
- One: It is infinitely easier to suffer publicly and with honor, than in the shadow and in dishonor.
- All: It is infinitely easier to suffer through putting one's bodily life at stake than to suffer through the spirit.
- One: Yet Christ suffered:
- All: In freedom, in solitude, in shadow and in dishonor, in body and in spirit.
- One: Since then, many Christians have suffered with him.
- All: Suffering Christ, we confess that we have chosen ease over the cost of discipleship. We have chosen apathy over action. We have turned away from injustice, all the while knowing that your hands and feet are our own. Forgive us when we desert, deny, or betray. Lord, have mercy on us.

He was despised, and we held him of no account. ⁴Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases, yet we accounted him stricken; struck down by God, and afflicted. ⁵ But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. ⁶ All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all. ⁷He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth. Like a lamb led to the slaughter or a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. ⁸By a perversion of justice he was taken away. Who could have imagined his future? For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people. ⁹ They made his grave with the wicked and his tomb with the rich, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.








³² Two other criminals were also led away to be put to death with him. ³³ When they came to the place that is called *The Skull*, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. ³⁴ Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. ³⁵ The people stood by watching, but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" ³⁶ The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, ³⁷ saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" ³⁸ There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." ³⁹ One of the criminals hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save vourself and us!" ⁴⁰ But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? ⁴¹ And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." ⁴² Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom." ⁴³ He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise." ⁴⁴ It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, ⁴⁵ while the sun's light failed, and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. ⁴⁶ Then Jesus, crying out with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Having said this, he breathed his last.
