# Week Four: Altogether Joy:

R1: In the summer of 1741, John Wesley Preached a sermon entitled "The Almost Christian", which drew distinction between "the almost Christian" who has an outward appearance of godliness but little depth, and "the altogether Christian" whose deep inward conviction to love God and neighbor with their whole being is lived daily in thought, word, and action.

All: In Advent and beyond, we seek to grow into altogether Christians. We come to worship today to cultivate altogether joy within our spirit.

- R2: Throughout the gospel narratives, Jesus would regularly go up the mountain to pray by himself. What he said or did in these private moments with God is not recorded. But we saw how those times fed His spirit as Jesus returned down the mountain. For Jesus, joy was not an emotional high experienced in moments of great triumph or achievement. Rather, joy was a gift he simply received in experiencing and knowing God's abiding presence. And deep joy stayed with him through adversity and suffering, sustaining his peace, hope and love when all else failed.
- All: We come to worship today to follow Jesus in embodying altogether joy one that cannot be manufactured or managed, but only received and treasured.
- R3: We light four candles on the advent wreath today. The first for peace, the second for hope, the third for love, and the fourth to remind us of Christ's call to altogether joy a gift given to us by a gracious God in silent nights, simple stables, angels' songs, and redeeming grace a gift rediscovered in singing the old story, celebrating "God and sinners reconciled"!
- All: Come, Lord Jesus, cast away our almost joy content with lights, glitter, and material goods, and fill us with altogether joy that only you can give joy that recognizes in the manger the very real presence of God with us. Amen.

We are incorporated into God's mighty acts of salvation and given new birth through water and the Spirit. All this is God's gift, offered to us without price. ## RENUNCIATION OF SIN AND AFFIRMATION OF FAITH:

<sup>18</sup> Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be pregnant from the Holy Spirit. <sup>19</sup> Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to divorce her quietly. <sup>20</sup> But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. <sup>21</sup> She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." <sup>22</sup> All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: <sup>23</sup> "Look, the virgin shall become pregnant and give birth to a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." <sup>24</sup> When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife <sup>25</sup> but had no marital relations with her until she had given birth to a son, and he named him Jesus.

# Facing the Holidays with a Grieving Heart



The holidays are not always a happy, enchanting, joyous time for everyone.

As the holidays approach, many who have lost a loved one may experience a wide array of emotions, including anxiety, stress, fatigue, guilt, sadness/depression, and feeling isolated. These emotions, in turn, can affect our ability to cope with the pain and to utilize resources available to us. Following are some tips for facing the holidays in a time of grief:

- Begin early to think about your holidays. This is painful because we cannot help but to think about how things will be different this year without our loved one here. But putting it off doesn't allow time for us to process our thoughts and feelings or to grieve our loss. Talk to the family early about how you will observe the holidays this year.
- Be patient with yourself. Leave the words "I should..." or "I ought to..." out of your planning process. There is no right or wrong way to handle your celebrations.
- Make your wishes known upfront. There will be many people who may think they know what's best for you and want to make plans for you. This may be helpful to some and irritating to others. Pay attention to what you are feeling and listen to your heart. Be honest and make your feelings known before major plans get made. If you're not sure about something, give it a try. If it's too painful, that's okay. You can always step away. On the other hand, if you find yourself having fun, this does not mean you don't care about the loved one who has died. It's okay to go on with living.
- Recognize that family get-togethers and certain traditions may be difficult. Keep the memory of your loved one alive. Share stories and memories together. Spend time with people you find supportive and comforting.
- Remember that everyone grieves in their own way. What is right for you may not be right for someone else, and vice versa. Allow one another the freedom to feel whatever each is feeling, and to do what each needs to cope with the grief.
- Be prepared for the fact that well-meaning people who don't know your situation will wish you 'Happy Holidays!' or 'Merry Christmas!' All the standard décor of the season will be around you in stores and restaurants. There is no escaping the trappings of the season, so pace yourself when you're out and about during the holiday season.
- Don't be afraid to ask for help. Seek out professional services if you feel you need it.
- Keep in mind that the anticipation of the holiday is often worse than the holiday itself.
- Take care of yourself. Remember that grieving is both emotional work and physical work. Get plenty of rest, eat right, exercise, take a hot bath—do whatever you need to do to care for yourself. And allow the tears to come. This is a very normal expression of grief and can help with the healing.
